
(Infrastructure & Digital Opportunity)

INFRASTRUCTURE

- ~\$1 billion non-competitive, formula-based grant
 - Allocation based on the new FCC broadband availability map
 - First installment of 20% (~\$200 million)
- ~\$700 million estimated cost to connect remaining unserved/underserved locations
- Objective to think of broadband not only as an asset or platform, but also as an enabler
 - Produce positive, enhanced outcomes and transform lives and the Arkansas economy

Affordable Connectivity Program Helping Households Connect

The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC program that helps connect families and households struggling to afford internet service.

The Affordable Connectivity Program provides:

- Up to \$30/month discount for broadband service;
- Up to \$75/month discount for households on qualifying Tribal lands; and
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet purchased through a participating provider if the household contributes more than \$10 but less than \$50 toward the purchase price.

The Affordable Connectivity Program is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

Who Is Eligible?

A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if the household income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines, or if a member of the household meets at least *one* of the criteria below:

- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income internet program;
- Participates in one of these assistance programs:
 - SNAP
 - Medicaid
 - Federal Public Housing Assistance
 - Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
 - WIC
 - Veterans Pension or Survivor Benefits
 - or <u>Lifeline</u>;
- Participates in one of these assistance programs and lives on Qualifying Tribal lands:
 - Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance
 - Tribal TANF
 - Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
 - Tribal Head Start (income based)

Two-Steps to Enroll

- 1. Go to AffordableConnectivity.gov to submit an application or print out a mail-in application; and
- Contact your preferred participating provider to select a plan and have the discount applied to your bill.

Some providers may have an alternative application that they will ask you to complete.


Eligible households must both apply for the program and contact a participating provider to select a service plan.

Affordable Connectivity Program

- ACP is an FCC benefit program that helps ensure that households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, healthcare and more.
- Our County has an estimated 4,200 households that are eligible for assistance and only 1,268 households currently participate.

DIGITAL OPPORTUNITY

- ~\$20 million non-competitive, formula-based grant
- Partner and collaborate with Heartland Forward, and other stakeholders throughout the state, to produce a robust digital opportunity plan targeting certain covered populations, including:
 - Households earning less than 150% of the federal poverty guidelines (28%)
 - Individuals over the age of 60 (24%)
 - Incarcerated individuals (state) (1%)
 - Veterans (6%)
 - Disabled (18%)
 - Individuals with a language barrier (19%)
 - Racial and ethnic minorities (28%)
 - Rural Residents (55%)

Vision for Digital Opportunity




By 2030, every person, family, and community in Arkansas – regardless of location and income – will have access to:

- Affordable, reliable high-speed internet service in their homes, businesses, and community anchor institutions (i.e., libraries, schools, healthcare providers)
- The opportunity to enroll in basic computer skills training
- A computer, tablet, or mobile device

Barriers to Digital Opportunity



Despite having dozens of existing digital opportunity assets, there is still room for improvement when it comes to digital skills programming and curriculum in Arkansas. The state is also in the process of expanding its broadband infrastructure and bringing internet service to 100% of homes and businesses across the state.



Barriers to Digital Opportunity



In-person meetings, focus groups, and the survey highlighted the following barriers:

- → Lack of reliable at-home broadband infrastructure across all parts of the state
- → Issues with service reliability and slow internet speeds in areas where infrastructure exists
- → Differences in internet access between urban and rural communities
- → High service costs and low awareness of, and uptake in, Affordable Connectivity program
- → Customer service challenges with internet service providers (ISPs)
- → Limited opportunities for digital skills training, especially for Individuals with a language barrier




